

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## Crime Triangle



#### **OPPORTUNITY**

The Crime Triangle identifies three factors that create a criminal offense.

**Desire** of a criminal to commit a crime; **Target** of the criminal's desire; and the **Opportunity** for the crime to be committed.

You can break up the Crime Triangle by not giving the criminal the **Opportunity**. Stay alert and use good judgment by knowing whom and what is around you at all times. You can avoid becoming an easy target.



- Lock your doors and windows when you are at home. Criminals look for houses with the easiest entry.
- Install a peephole with a 190-degree viewing angle so that you can verify who is on the other side of your door.
- Before opening an exterior door to your home, know who is at the door and do not open the door to an unexpected visitor. This includes company employees and other solicitors.
- Exterior lighting provides additional protection from intruders. Inexpensive timers or photoelectric cells will automatically turn lights on and off at dusk and dawn.

The Houston Police Department wants you to be safe! By practicing these personal safety tips, you will reduce the opportunities criminals look for when targeting a crime victim.



#### Vehicle Safety

- Park in well-lighted areas so you can see your car and its surroundings from a distance.
- Have your car keys ready, look around and under your car and observe other vehicles parked nearby for suspicious persons before approaching.
- Glance into the backseat and at the floorboards of your car before entering to check for anyone hiding inside.
- If you think someone is following you, do not go home. Drive to the nearest police station, fire station, open gas station, or
  - well-lighted place where there are people that can help you.
- hood and tie a white cloth to the door handle to signal for help. Get back into the car and keep the doors and windows locked. If someone stops, ask them to call for help. Do not accept rides from anyone.

December 2019 crime in Sharpstown as reported to HPD was 36. January of 2020 shows 21 which is a whopping 42% decrease. The citywide crime stats also showed a decrease from Dec to Jan of 25%. #### **DEFINITIONS OF CRIME TYPES**

**Robbery** — The taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation.

**Burglary** — (breaking and entering) an unlawful entry into a building for the purposes of committing an offence. Usually that offence is theft.

**Theft** — the act of stealing; the wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods or property of another; larceny. Examples include ransacking unlocked cars, taking property out of open garage doors, taking a purse off a front seat of an unlocked car, taking a mower out of the back of a pickup truck.

**Aggravated Assault** — an attempt to cause serious bodily injury purposely.

**Rape** — unlawful sexual activity carried out against the will of a male, female, or person under age, or incapable of consent.



#### **DEED RESTRICTIONS**

#### WHO AM 1?

Who am I? Where do I live? These are easy questions for most of us, but not always for some seniors or other cognitively challenged individuals. A pleasant stroll in the neighborhood can turn into a terrifying experience for both the walker and their family if the walker becomes disoriented. Recent incidents in the Westbury area of Houston highlighted this problem when Good Samaritans found senior citizens who took a wrong turn and found themselves on an unfamiliar street. The seniors were not carrying any form of identification to aid in redirecting them. And, sadly, the Good Samaritans failed to notify law enforcement until much later. Had they promptly reported the disoriented individuals AND if the walkers had carried ID, their safe return to their worried families would have occurred much sooner. Please remind your neighbors and family members to always carry something showing their name, address and a contact phone number and, if you encounter someone who has lost their way, report it immediately to both HPD and SEAL.

#### HOVER TRUCK?

Have you noticed a new truck in the neighborhood that is so innovative it has no tires? Unfortunately, there are no hover trucks yet.

Sharpstown and other neighborhoods are experiencing a crime of opportunity



that is being repeated across the city. The most attractive targets are Chevrolet or GMC pickups. The owner parks the new truck in full view outside of their garage. Having a security camera is no protection even if the camera is pointed at the driveway or, as in this photo, the curb. What many have reported is that the camera gets pointed away sometime earlier in the day before the theft takes place. Thieves apparently come through to case the neighborhood and take measures to eliminate getting caught on camera later in the night. The actual removal of the tires takes only seconds and can be done in near silence. The fancier the tires, the more attractive the hit.

Here is how you can protect your vehicles and remove crimes of opportunity in Sharpstown:

Avoid parking in the street for your daily parking. Granted it is hard for some of us, but if you have a new truck, please protect it. Our homes were built with garages and this is the safest place.

Don't leave items in your vehicle. If they are not removing tires, they will check what you left inside.

Cameras are great, but only after the fact if they haven't been tampered with. Don't expect them to stop the crime.

## REMODELING YOUR HOME? ADDING ON?

Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Sharpstown Civic Association can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that we have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. #### ALL ABOUT TREES

#### TREES ALONG PROPERTY LINES

The SCA office gets many calls about tree disputes between neighbors. If you have a tree that grows into your neighbor's yard or over their house; it is well within their right to prune it away

from their property. It would be advisable to speak to your neighbor beforehand as they may want to trim it themselves. They might not even realize it has encroached onto your property.



Do you have a dangerous tree on your property? Please have it removed before it damages your property or someone else's. We

recommend that if your neighbor has a tree that you feel could endanger your property to put them on written notice if they are unwilling to take care of the problem. Please be a good neighbor!

#### STREET TREES

All the trees located on City Easements are protected. Did you know all the trees located in front of your sidewalk belong to the City of Houston? Most Sharpstown property lines begin behind the sidewalk. If you witness the removal of a city tree from a street easement, please call 832-395-7200 immediately to report it so the City can minimize tree loss. This phone line is monitored 24 hours a day.

#### TREE STUMP GRINDING

Has the City removed a tree from the right of way in between the sidewalk and street in front of your home? Call 311 to request tree stump grinding.

## HOUSE NUMBERS EASILY READ?

Take a look at your house numbers today. Do you have house numbers on your house and are the numbers readily visible from the street? Did you know that the city requires EVERY home to have a visible house number, so that emergency vehicles can respond quickly to the correct address.

A house number painted on the curb is helpful, but it can be obscured by a parked car. The ordinance says a house number should be placed either on the primary door or within 18 inches from that door. If your house was built before 1979, then the numbers have to be at least 2" tall. If your house was built between 1979 and 2010, then the numbers have to be at least 3" tall. If your house was built after January 2010, then the numbers should be at least 4" tall.

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#### HARRIS COUNTY CORONAVIRUS RUMOR CONTROL

A new coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) was recently detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China and is causing an outbreak of respiratory illness. The current risk of contracting the virus in the United States remains low. However, Harris County is working closely with Harris County Public Health, The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in monitoring developments. Any confirmed cases will be promptly reported to the public. Novel Coronavirus is an emerging, rapidly evolving situation. To stay up-to-date on information, please refer to CDC who provides information as it becomes available, in addition to updated guidance.

Unfortunately, the uncertainty surrounding the novel coronavirus outbreak has led to misinformation and unsubstantiated rumors regarding the virus in Harris County. Currently, there are no confirmed cases in Harris County. It is vital that residents rely on trusted and reliable health sources of information regarding novel coronavirus. Misinformation and rumors have spread quickly on social media, thus it may not be the most reliable source of information. RUMOR: PEOPLE IN HOUSTON HAVE TESTED POSITIVE FOR THE NOVEL CORONAVIRUS AFTER COMING INTO CONTACT WITH A VISITOR FROM CHINA AND ARE CURRENTLY IN AN "ISOLATION WARD."

False. There are zero cases of novel coronavirus in Houston or Harris County. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the risk of contracting coronavirus remains low in the United States. Any confirmed cases of novel coronavirus will be promptly disclosed to the public should they occur.

We are still in an active Flu season, however, and residents are encouraged to take every day preventative steps to avoid spreading respiratory illnesses by covering your cough, washing hands frequently, and staying home if you are sick. For a list of steps to take click here.

## RUMOR: IT IS UNSAFE TO TRAVEL TO CHINATOWN DUE TO THE NOVEL CORONAVIRUS.

False. There is currently no reason for residents in Harris County to take out-of-the ordinary precautions related to novel coronavirus in any Asian businesses. Businesses are safe to visit. As always, routine healthy habits help prevent the spread of the flu, and other viruses. Seasonal flu is always a real concern and has caused more than 12 thousand deaths, including 78 children, from October 1, 2019 – February 1, 2020. Flu season begins in October and can last as long as May.

RUMOR: AN EMPLOYEE AT A BUSINESS IN CHINATOWN IN SOUTHWEST HOUSTON HAS TESTED POSITIVE FOR THE NOVEL CORONAVIRUS.

False. There are zero cases of coronavirus in Houston or Harris County. It is safe to visit businesses across the region.

#### RUMOR: I SHOULD WEAR A MASK TO PROTECT MYSELF FROM THE NOVEL CORONAVIRUS.

False. The CDC does not recommend that people who are well wear a facemask to protect themselves from respiratory viruses, including coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). For additional information on the prevention and treatment of coronavirus, visit the CDC website here.

#### RUMOR: PEOPLE TRAVELING TO THE US FROM CHINA ARE SPREADING NOVEL CORONAVIRUS.

False. The United States government is taking unprecedented steps to prevent and control the spread of novel coronavirus in the United States. A Presidential Proclamation on novel coronavirus mandates new travel procedures. Foreign nationals, people who are citizens of any country other than the United States, who have visited China within the last 14 days are not being allowed into the U.S. United States citizens, permanent residents, and their families who have visited China within the last 14 days are being allowed to enter the United States but are being redirected to one of 11 airports for health screenings. Depending on their health and travel history, they will have some level of restrictions placed on their movements for 14 days from the time they left China. Fourteen days is the maximum incubation period for novel coronavirus.

#### RUMOR: THE FLU VACCINE CAN PROTECT ME AGAINST NOVEL CORONAVIRUS.

False. The flu shot (vaccine) won't protect against coronavirus. We are still in an active Flu season, however, and residents are encouraged to get a flu vaccine, taking every day preventative steps to avoid spreading respiratory illnesses by covering your cough, washing hands, and staying home if you are sick. #### RUMOR: IS IT TRUE THERE IS A CASE OF CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) IN SAN ANTONIO?

True. There is a case who tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) that came on a State Department-chartered flight from China and was under a federal quarantine order at JBSA-Lackland, San Antonio, Texas. The individual is currently isolated and receiving medical care at a designated hospital.

# FALSE CORONAVIRUS RUMORS CRUSH BUSINESS AS THEY SPREAD THROUGH CHINATOWN

Lunchtime is usually bustling in Houston's Chinatown, when thousands of people head to restaurants or take breaks to buy Asian specialties in its supermarkets. But empty parking lots have been plaguing the otherwise vibrant neighborhood since Sunday, when rumors started spreading about a coronavirus outbreak here.

Business has dropped 40 to 70 percent this week as a result, owners said.

"I normally serve around 4,000 customers per day, and I am now seeing maybe a thousand," said Feng Chen, the owner of Jusgo Supermarket at 9280 Bellaire Blvd.

Posts on a popular Chinese social media platform called We Chat falsely stated that Jusgo Supermarket was shut down by Houston authorities because of concerns about the coronavirus. The rumor spread to Twitter and Instagram, said the owner, adding that he hired a law firm to trace the social media posts.

"We want to make this information very clear: There are no confirmed cases of coronavirus anywhere in the state of Texas," Dr. David Persse, health authority for the Houston Health Department, said after a press conference there Friday. "There are no concerns about a virus here at all."

U.S. Rep. Al Green called the area safe. "In fact, Chinatown, all of Houston and Texas are safe places to be, and we encourage people to deal with facts and not fear," he said. "We want people to know that this is a very vicious and malicious rumor that's being spread; they are harmful, and we want to stop it."

If people are caught spreading rumors, they may face liability for lost revenue in the area, he said.

Chen said his supermarket is losing around \$20,000 to \$30,000 a day, and that many other companies in the area are suffering as well. Wang Lin, the owner of Welcome Food Center, a couple of blocks away on Bellaire, said business is down about 40 percent this week.

Tan Tan on Ranchester Drive, one of the most popular restaurants in Chinatown for its extensive menu of Chinese and Vietnamese dishes, was serving only three of its almost 70 tables midday Friday, a peak time.

"Business has been really bad for the last days," said Muoi Ma, manager of Tan Tan. "We normally see 100 or 200 people here every day from everywhere, but rumors have scared people," she said, estimating that business has slowed down nearly 70 percent.

Ray Luk was reading an Asian newspaper while waiting for his favorite fish soup at Tan Tan, where he is a regular. "I heard about the rumors, but I don't believe a thing about it," he said. "I know there is not one case in Houston."

Kenneth Li, chairman of the South West Management District covering almost half of Chinatown, said the impact of rumors and fears could have a ripple effect in the community. "When a restaurant is affected, its employees are affected, its providers, and so on," he said.

A local taskforce is creating an informational campaign to dispel rumors and educate people about the virus, said Wea H. Lee, CEO of the International Trade Center in Chinatown.

Persse, from the Houston Health Department, said that coronavirus behaves much like any other viral illness, spreading through coughing and sneezing. "If you have those symptoms here in Texas, we can say that you probably have influenza," and January and February are peak flu season, he said.

Persse urged Houstonians to "Stop listening to Dr. Twitter; get the facts, and don't panic."

If, like me, you want to experience ram-don noodles at home, you



#### S GESSNER PAVING-STRIPING: LETTER FROM SCA TO DISTRICT J AND RESPONSE

We rely on District J to help with issues in Sharpstown – here is an ongoing concern.

Dear District J,

A city contractor has done patch replacement on S. Gessner between Beechnut and Harwin. They appear to be finished. However, there are no lane markings painted to divide the lanes and it is hazardous to drive down a 3 lane street with no dividing lines. Can you find out when the lines will be painted and possibly help to expedite this to eliminate this dangerous situation.

In addition, the contractor did a poor job as the pavement is now rough and uneven. It would be great if an inspector could review the quality of work as it appears to be substandard.

#### IT'S TIME TO BE COUNTED!

US Census 2020 How many people live here in the Sharpstown neighborhood? How do we find out? The government does a population count every ten years, called a "census", and this is a census year. There are three ways to respond to the 2020 Census. By April 1, 2020, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census.

You will have three options for responding:

 $\rightarrow$  Online  $\rightarrow$  By phone  $\rightarrow$  By mail

In mid-March, households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census. Census Day is April 1, 2020.

Why respond? It's important that the count be correct because it affects funding, schools, voting districts, developers and others who rely on the data to make decisions.

Ten years ago, it is estimated that zip code 77074 was "under reported" by 24%. Zip code 77036 was "under reported" at 12%. When people do not get counted, then they are invisible. It is very important for Sharpstown, the City of Houston, and our state that as many people as possible here in Sharpstown get COUNTED.

The US Census Bureau is employing Census Takers this Spring. You must be at least 18 years old. Harris County is paying \$22-\$24.50 per hour plus transportation.

#### CONNECT SOUTH **APARTMENTS**

The SCA has recently been made aware of a proposed building project on Hillcroft. The Connect Community Apartments, a proposed mixed-use mixed-income apartment community, will be located at 6440 Hillcroft Ave.

Though this project and several others around Houston did get City approval in February, the application is currently under review by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. There will be several public hearings throughout the state during the Spring and comments can be left with the TDHCA up until June 19, 2020.

#### RECYCLING THE RIGHT WAY

The City of Houston publishes a trash and recycling collection schedule but there are circumstances that often alter this schedule. Leave your container out and the next day is usually catch up day. If in doubt, call 311 or Scott at the SCA office for information. Here's a quick refresher on what to place in your GREEN curbside recycling bin and what goes in the black curbside trash container. Put these items in your GREEN Bin (make sure you empty and rinse plastic, metal, glass and coated containers).









METAL AND CANS

PLASTICS #1-5 & #7

CARDBOARD & CARTONS

PAPER & NEWSPAPER

#### METAL and CANS:

Aluminum and Tin Cans (rinsed drained)

#### PLASTICS:

Plastic Containers #1 - 5 and 7 (rinsed drained)

#### **CARDBOARD and CARTONS:**

Carton - Cardboard boxes and cartons from items such as milk, juice, soup, crackers, cream, beans, water, broth, wine, etc.

#### PAPER:

Paper. Newspaper, Catalogs, Magazines and Phone Books



#### GLASS:

Effective immediately, glass is accepted in the green curbside recycling bin.

Please don't put dirty paper (greasy pizza boxes), large plastic items like old toys, or plastic bags in the green bin!

These items clog the machinery used to process recyclables resulting in delays and expense.

You may place waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 pm on the Friday prior to collection.



## Proper Disposal of MOTOR OIL

Motor Oil is not collected in your curbside recycling or trash cart



#### DRAIN

Place motor oil in clean, leak-proof container. Do not mix oil with any other liquids.





KEEP Place oil filter in clean, leak-proof container. Do not place in trash or

storm drains.



RECYCLE Take used motor oil and filter to local auto parts retailer.

## DEED RESTRICTION PROJECT UPDATE:
