

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME TYPES

Robbery — the taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation.

Burglary — (breaking and entering) an unlawful entry into a building for the purposes of committing an offence. Usually that offence is theft.

Theft — the act of stealing; the wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods or property of another; larceny. Examples include ransacking unlocked cars, taking property out of open garage doors, taking a purse off a front seat of an unlocked car, taking a mower out of the back of a pickup truck.

Aggravated Assault — an attempt to cause serious bodily injury purposely.

Property Crime — destruction, damage, vandalism

Rape — unlawful sexual activity carried out against the will of a male, female, or person under age, or incapable of consent.


In December, under the direction of Officer Andrea Brinson of HPD Midwest, volunteers gathered to wrap toys that were ultimately given to over 60 families.


DO YOU KNOW YOUR DEED RESTRICTIONS?

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Sharpstown Civic Association can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that we have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. 

NO POULTRY ALLOWED IN SHARPSTOWN!!! Both City ordinances and Sharpstown Deed Restrictions prohibit poultry at our properties. No chickens, ducks, geese, etc. are allowed – period! Be smart and save yourself the cost of a city citation and loss of your birds. GARAGE SALE 101

Here is a guide to what is and is not allowed in Sharpstown.



- A garage sale is for selling your unwanted personal items not a business for selling merchandise from others.
- You cannot rent out your garage or driveway to other people to conduct a sale.

STORM DRAIN PROBLEMS

If you have a storm drain in front of your house, please check to see if it has any debris. It doesn't matter whether it is leaves, pine needles, or trash--pick it up and throw it away. Don't let it flow into the storm drain and become part of a bigger problem.

THE PROBLEM WITH PLASTIC

We live in the richest country in the world, and we produce more trash than any other country. Many of us recycle our plastic and believe that we are doing a good deed. However, did you know that less than 9% of plastic produced in the US is recycled? Most plastic is put in landfills, incinerated, or littered.

How can we do more to reduce this problem? First, be sure that you only recycle plastic that has the recycle mark and is either #1-5, or #7. Garbage bags can't be recycled, so don't put your recyclables in one. Newspaper and grocery bags can't be recycled, either. Be sure that the plastic that is put in your bin is clean, as contaminated plastic is removed and sent to the landfill.

Second, try to use less plastic. Instead of plastic bottles of water, get a refillable bottle. Put a reusable bag in your car and teach yourself to take it into the grocery store with you. Opt for paper bags instead of plastic because they are more easily, and more commonly, recycled. Avoid buying prepackaged food in the grocery store. Buy shampoo, detergents, and cleaning products packaged in paper, glass, or aluminum.

Like going on a diet, reducing our use of plastic requires teaching ourselves new ways of doing things. Sometimes, changing these habits is not only difficult, but requires more time and effort. However, if we all make small changes in our behavior, we will help make the world a better, healthier, place for the future.

DON'T MURDER THE MYRTLES!

Just a reminder—as you trim your crape myrtles, don't top them. This creates an ugly knot which will grow weak branches and will make the tree susceptible to pests and disease. Instead, remove damaged or weak branches, those that may affect pedestrians, clearance, or visibility, and branches that cross or grow towards the center. This will create a more beautiful specimen for all to enjoy.



TREES OF SHARPSTOWN

Sharpstown has many beautiful trees that were planted when the neighborhood was being built. The Sharpstown Parks Alliance is spotlighting the Southern Live Oak in this issue.

A study by Rice University, the Houston Health Department, and Houston Wilderness has identified the Live Oak as the number one "super tree" that will help make the city more livable. Live oaks pull ozone, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, and sulfur dioxide from the air. This alone is an excellent reason to plant them in Houston.

The Southern Live Oak, unlike most oak trees, is nearly evergreen and replaces its leaves in a few short weeks in early spring. They have an extensive root system and wide, spreading branches, so they should be planted at least 15 feet from your house and 10 feet from a walkway or driveway. You'll notice in Sharpstown that many people trees that were planted too close to the house have been improperly pruned, while those planted farther away from the house have been (mostly) allowed to grow into beautiful trees that provide abundant shade. This is also a strong tree that withstands hurricanes, so planted in the right place, this is a beautiful tree for Houston.

FREE TREES!!!!

Now is the best time to plant a tree, and Trees For Houston has just the solution! They will be giving away free trees on Saturday, February 19th, and Saturday, February 26th, at their new headquarters at 2001 W. 34th St. (70018). They usually have a variety of trees that are appropriate for the area including several types of oaks, river birch, cypress, and loblolly pines. Pickups go from 9:00-11:00 both days. Their website (www.treesforhouston.org) also has excellent information about how to plant and prune trees.

HOW WE BECAME SHARPSTOWN-IANS - PART II

So, when our third daughter arrived and we were five in a two-bedroom apartment, it was clearly time to look for a house. At first, we drove around the neighborhood. We saw a house with a FOR SALE sign in the yard, very near Sutton Elementary. Although we learned quickly that the proper procedure, if one is interested in the house, is to call the phone number on the sign, we, being first time home buyers, simply knocked on the door. It was then we also learned what seemed to be The Rule when an interested party asks the owner even basic questions about the house. A realtor is being paid to show the house. DON'T SAY ANYTHING! The realtor will answer questions.

"Hi, we saw the sign. Could we have a quick look at the house?"

"I'll call the realtor."

"Great, how many...."

"The realtor is coming. She'll be here as quickly as she can."

"OK, but could you just tel...."

"She said she would be right here."

It was made clear there should be no more questions until the realtor arrived. She did, we were shown around and decided we would buy the house, but we knew nothing about buying a house.

My parents in Fort Worth offered to drive down and give us some advice. My dad saw the house and liked it but he thought it would be too small for five of us as the girls grew up and would want to have a room to themselves. So, we looked some more. The same realtor gave us a couple of addresses to look at. The first was on Bellaire Boulevard, but waayy out. This was in 1974 and there was very little west of Gessner then. We drove for miles and still weren't even close to the address. I was working at another radio station, KXYZ, in the Fannin Bank building at Fannin and Holcombe and I couldn't see driving that far to work six days a week, so I stopped there and turned around. There must be houses for sale closer in. On the way



back we turned into the neighborhood off Bellaire and Osage. A few blocks down, we saw a sign in a yard on Galleon Drive. Another peculiarity of Houston, I learned. Galleon is five blocks long. Memorial is a Drive. Galleon isn't. The house wasn't occupied and, we learned later, the owners had built a house in Katy and had not lived there in months. Our realtor showed it to us and we liked it although there were some things that were not easy to like. A large sycamore tree in the back yard had dropped tons of leaves which had been rained on and turned into a pile of muck on the patio.

The den, which was already dark because there were no windows, had been painted a dark blue color and then "enhanced" by what looked like a Kleenex dipped in black paint and dabbed over the blue. Another realtor told me much later than everyone she had shown the house to never got past the Blue Den. It had been on the market for over nine months. To Be Continued!

FERAL CATS IN SHARPSTOWN

On November 18th, 2021 - on Nextdoor, I saw this post:

Sharpstown TNR Squad. Neighbors, I have been doing TNR (trapneuter-return of stray cats) in Sharpstown area for the past year and half. There is such a great need for feline population control in our area. TNR must be vigorously done in order to control the population. There is no simple alternative. Some people are misguided to think if we don't feed cats, there won't be so many cats. That's simply not true. They are still there. You just don't see them gathering. I need a squad of TNR volunteers. Coordination of our efforts can make the task more manageable. TNR is only effective if a big enough percentage of cats are fixed in each colony. It's best to coordinate efforts so we know the progress in each colony. I saw the success in the Braeswood area near medical center, and how their neighbors band together to TNR more than 200 cats in the past year, I feel envious. There are so many good people in Sharpstown, and I think we can form a TNR squad too!

The approach is multifaceted:

- 1. We need to educate people to spay and neuter their pets and strays, especially if they feed. No free roaming unfixed cats. Can you help talk to people about the importance of fixing animals? I have resources for low cost or free surgeries. I especially need people who are bilingual.
- 2. We need trappers. Especially near Chinatown. It's quite fun actually. Once you perfect the techniques, it can be done efficiently and you fit it into your schedule. What joy when the trap door closes with a bang and you cheer!
- 3. We need transporters. Can you fit it in your day to drop off cats at the vet and/or pick up? Typically dropoff time is 7:30-8:30 am and pickup is 3:30-5:30 pm from various vet clinics around town. I rely on All Cats Veterinarian on Stella Link as well As Texas Litter Control in Humble, Tomball, and Spring (too far, I know!)
- 4. Temporary holding of cats in recovery is needed. This can be done in your garage or utility room.
- 5. Temporary fosters needed. Sometimes we find friendly cats or baby kittens in the process and will need a temporary foster. I will find rescue backing. I promise you won't be stuck with the cats.
- 6. Donation is needed. I hesitate to put this item in here because I don't want neighbors to feel anyone could profit from this project. Truth is, it costs to do TNR. Supplies like canned cat food for bait, pee pads, towels, gas money, some emergency medical costs. Little things add up.

Currently I am doing it alone, in both residential and commercial areas in Sharpstown and Chinatown. I could really use some help. If you are able to help with trapping, transport to and from surgeries, temporary fostering, or fundraising, we will be able to get this under control a little faster. I will show you how to do everything and help get you a trap. Feel free to message me.

Fast forward to today...I have now been an active 'trapper' since Nov 2021. In my section of Sharpstown alone, Section 5 - which is one of the smaller ones of only 325 homes, I have been able to take care of 17 cats so far. We have also taken care of others in Terrace 1 and Section 1 in the last two months alone. The number of kittens that have been prevented is huge!

COMMUNITY HAPPENINGS

BEHIND THE SCENES VOLUNTEERS AT BONHAM PARK

Sharpstown Section 3, south of HBU, is one of the smaller sections of Sharpstown but has a huge impact for our community at large. It is home to Bonham Elementary, Sugar Grove Academy (middle school for all sections except 1&2) and home of Sharpstown High School. Along Braes Acres there is also a city park that backs up to Bonham Elementary. It is one of the most used parks because of the expanse of flat fields for soccer playing. Many that grew up in Sharpstown remember Bonham as the park with the mysterious "Hill".

A few years ago, through a negotiated agreement, a developer that was rebuilding an apartment complex revamped the walking trails through the park. What was left was a nice feature in a blank park with few amenities. TIRZ#20 chose to invest in landscaping and improvements that would enhance the added retention basin/soccer field on the south end of the park. Since those improvements the neighbors living near the park began making sure the garbage was being picked up on a regular basis. They even took it on themselves to call the parks department about installing better placed garbage barrels to make it easier for the users of the park to clean up after themselves. The collective efforts of each neighbor has set the tone for the park and the trash problem that once was pervasive is now only occasional and easily cleaned up if things get left behind. We are proud of this nice clean park now and want to thank all that put effort into keeping it a place we can enjoy.

Maybe you live near your neighborhood park. Take a trash bag with you when you take a walk and just pick up what you can as you walk through. If we all do this, the parks don't end up as troubling for the neighborhood. The city gets the message that we appreciate and respect the privilege of having a park in our neighborhood.



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

RECYCLING THE RIGHT WAY

The City of Houston publishes a trash and recycling collection schedule but there are circumstances that often alter this schedule. Leave your container out and the next day is usually catch up day. If in doubt, call 311 or Scott at the SCA office for information. Here's a quick refresher on what to place in your GREEN curbside recycling bin and what goes in the black curbside trash container. Put these items in your GREEN Bin (make sure you empty and rinse plastic, metal, glass and coated containers).

PAPER & **NEWSPAPER**

METAL and CANS:

Aluminum and Tin Cans (rinsed drained)

METAL AND CANS PLASTICS #1-5

PLASTICS:

Plastic Containers #1 - 5 and 7 (rinsed drained)

CARDBOARD and CARTONS:

Carton - Cardboard boxes and cartons from items such as milk, juice, soup, crackers, cream, beans, water, broth, wine, etc.

PAPER:

Paper. Newspaper, Catalogs, Magazines and Phone Books



GLASS:

Effective immediately, glass is accepted in the green curbside recycling bin.

Please don't put dirty paper (greasy pizza boxes), large plastic items like old toys, or plastic bags in the green bin!

These items clog the machinery used to process recyclables resulting in delays and expense.

You may place waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 pm on the Friday prior to collection.

TRASH FACTS



How to set out your garbage and recycling:

- · City-provided containers must be placed at the curb between 6 p.m. the day before and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.
- Container must face the street with handle facing house.
- Containers must be accessible and not blocked by obstacles, including parked cars, trees, mailboxes, fencing etc. Blocked containers will not be emptied.
- · Leave at least a 3ft space between garbage and recycling container. This allows the truck to operate safely.
- Containers must be removed from the curb line and/or public view by 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection and stored in a secure location.
