PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

January 1st, 2023

I usually go to bed around 10pm but last night - as most of you, didn't go to sleep until the Sharpstown unofficial neighborhood fireworks display ended...on my street about 1:15AM. Not sure what to say about that - how about I didn't hear any reports of deaths, fires? I am glad it's over and Happy New Year!!

I am working on the Nov – Dec – Jan Scan after much procrastinating...through sleepy eyes. There is so much I could comment on. November elections, direction change on DR update, unbelievable turn out at our November annual meeting, what will 2023 bring....just a few of my jumbled thoughts and all are very interrelated.

Our Deed Restrictions are outdated and lack the legal teeth of years past. Updating these with the recommended move to full HOA/mandatory dues/209 was done. However, the effort and education process by the board to get 51% of each section to pass was not accomplished in 2022. You can read more about this later in the issue. This process had some interesting outcomes.

Did you attend our November annual meeting? In years past we have averaged 50 - 70 mighbors with 40 or so veting

neighbors with 40 or so voting. As the result of the invitations to come support that were sent out by various groups, we had more than 450 neighbors with over 260 ballots cast for board member elections. We were overwhelmed to say the least. We did our best to check people in so they could cast their vote and enjoy turkey potluck. At a normal election we would have announced the election outcome and headed to our homes by 8:15pm. With the large # of ballots and large number of persons running, the ballot counters worked until after 10pm. I am sorry for not having that night be less taxing but oh what an amazing show of Sharpstown support. As the lines formed, I remember thinking...this could be my last meeting as SCA president. So many of you I didn't know that were in the lines waiting to vote. Of course, I wanted to be reelected but I can also remember thinking, how proud I was of my neighbors for coming to make their will be known – no matter what that will is.

With the DR Update subject there was much dialogue between supporters and opponents. At least 3 of our newly elected board members are now about to serve as a result of this topic. I hope they can help us come up with the best ways to enforce our deed restrictions, architectural controls and overall safety programs. I welcome their new ideas and energy as we move forward as a board

Since there were more running than open positions, I now invite those that did not get elected to see the committee list in this issue and come serve in that capacity. It is a meaningful way to have your viewpoints heard and put in place important actions. We need you!

I am grateful for your support, your dues payments, your feedback and your Sharpstown pride. Let's get to work on 2023 together.... after a nap!

DEED RESTRICTION UPDATE - WHY IT WAS STOPPED?

On October 31, 2022, the SCA Board of Directors discontinued the Deed Restriction Update initiative and disabled voting on it. The decision was made after reviewing the number of approvals to date, considering community feedback and weighing that against the effort for an eventual success.

The initiative to update the deed restrictions began as an effort to address years of problems enforcing deed restrictions and architectural standards due to outdated language which left our courts with little to no recourse against violators and their neighbors intensely frustrated.

The decision to discontinue these efforts means that the Board will have to find new, creative ways to use our existing tools to meet community expectations of enforcement.

If we made Feb-April of 2021, during the freeze, stats the same as 2022, we would have had 309 reported crimes to HPD in 2021 compared to 306 for 2022. In actuality, Sharpstown crime was down compared to last year!!!

We had less than 1 crime per day if you look at it that way. Can we improve? Reduce crimes of opportunity to our vehicles or belongings in garages? Keep up a better guard for juggings? If you have ideas on this, please come serve on the Safety and Security Committee for 2023. Your ideas are needed to keep Sharpstown the safe island that we are.



DEFINITIONS OF CRIME TYPES

Robbery — the taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation.

Burglary — (breaking and entering) an unlawful entry into a building for the purposes of committing an offence. Usually that offence is theft.

Theft — the act of stealing; the wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods or property of another; larceny. Examples include ransacking unlocked cars, taking property out of open garage doors, taking a purse off a front seat of an unlocked car, taking a mower out of the back of a pickup truck.

Aggravated Assault — an attempt to cause serious bodily injury purposely.

Property Crime — destruction, damage, vandalism

Rape — unlawful sexual activity carried out against the will of a male, female, or person under age, or incapable of consent.


LOOKING FOR HPD IN ALL THE RIGHT PLACES


PICK IT UP

GARAGE SALE 101

Here is a guide to what is and is not allowed in Sharpstown.



- A garage sale is for selling your unwanted personal items not a business for selling merchandise from others.
- You cannot rent out your garage or driveway to other people to conduct a sale.

DO YOU KNOW YOUR DEED RESTRICTIONS?

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Sharpstown Civic Association can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that we have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. WON'T YOU BE MY NEIGHBOR? (COVER STORY)

Hi, my name is Erica Billings. My husband is Thomas, our eldest son is Kalel, and our youngest son is Noel. In January of 2020 we moved to Sharpstown from the Heights to be closer to Thomas's office, and a school we learned of for Kalel. We are currently renting, but hope to buy a house soon, and make Sharpstown our long-term home. Since living here, we've scouted other nearby neighborhoods, and it is clear we are in the right place for us.

We are continually surprised by how many original owners we meet, or people who grew up here, moved away for a few years, and then came back to buy their own home...and have spent additional decades here as an adult! We love the trees!!! We love the homes. We love our park. We love the proximity to the best the city has to offer. And we love our neighbors.

Neighbors are what make any place a great place to live. And I want to introduce you to my next-door neighbors; they, like many of you, truly embody what it means to be a good neighbor, and they help make this a great place for our family to live. Meet Liz and Luis and their two boys, Ethan and Ollie. Liz is from Puerto Rico, and Luis is from Oaxaca, Mexico.

When we moved in, the pandemic was just beginning. So, we got to know our neighbors very slowly. As a household, we operated very cautiously and kept our distance for a while. Then, Liz and I began to occasionally leave food for each other on our front doorsteps. Eventually, we began to sit outside together in the front yards,

socially distanced, while the kids played with masks on. After a while, we dropped the masks and the distance, but continued to only spend time outdoors in the front yards and backyards. As time went on, we began to visit in each other's homes. And as more time went on, I began to send my kids next door without me, and vice versa. Liz and I still like to visit in each other's homes, but we also like to get a break from our kids and send them next door!

Liz frequently brings me homemade food or coffee or delicious pan de muerto (bread for Dia de los Muertos) from Luis's father's bakery in Oaxaca; and I frequently send her homemade food, matcha, a glass of wine, and clothes my kids have outgrown. When we moved in our little Noel had just turned 6 months old; they watched him grow from a baby. Now Ollie is 7 months old, and we are watching him grow. Our eldest sons are only six months apart and play together multiple times a week.

Liz and Luis are good neighbors. They offer help and check in on their neighbors. They water our garden when we are out of town. They have watched my kids in a pinch.



LIVING IN SHARPSTOWN

My last article was about street names in Sharpstown. I mentioned that there seems to be no pattern to the names, unlike downtown Houston where several streets are named for Texas governors, or Bellaire where there is a section of streets with first names of people and a number of streets named for trees or plants. I wrote that I knew of only one Sharpstown street with a "plant" name, Croton.

I was corrected, emphatically, by a reader in the next SCAN. There seem to be several Sharpstown streets with botanical names. The reader appears to know of some or at least did some deep research into the streets seemingly named for plants and trees, starting with Beechnut. In my defense, that's the nut of a Beech tree and not the tree itself. And I did mention Beech in Bellaire as an example of a street named for a type of tree.

It was mentioned that there is a Barberton Daisey. I had to look up that up. Wikipedia says a Barberton Daisy is indigenous to Southeast Africa. I feel sure if I go to Houston Garden Center looking for a croton, I can leave with a croton. In fact, they're on sale in their current ad. If I go there and ask for a Barberton Daisy, I'm not so sure I would find one, but that's not saying they don't exist.

I assumed Osage Street was named for the Native American tribe. The reader pointed out that Osage is a type of wild orange. A Wikipedia search for Osage brings up the tribe first, but it says "it can also refer to a tree in the mulberry family." It's very possible the street was named for the Osage mulberry tree and not the tribe. After all, there is already a Mulberry Street in Montrose.

I'm not a birdwatcher either, but the mention of Tanager Street brings to my mind a bird called a Scarlet Tanager. Tanager, the reader says,

is also an African daisy which I was not aware of. A Google search confirms this, and in fact, lists the daisy before the bird.

A Rowan bush is known as a Mountain Ash. True. I looked it up. However, their highest species diversity is in the Himalaya, Southern Tibet and parts of Western China, and they are unrelated to the true ash trees.

So, the question is, how did Sharpstown's streets get their names? Was Barberton named for a Southeast African daisy or someone named Barberton? Was Romney Road (and if it's only two blocks long, why is it called a road?) named for a person named Romney or the Latin name Romneya, "a genus of flowering plants belonging to the poppy family", as the reader suggests. Was Rowan Lane named for a bush that grows in Southern Tibet and, despite being called a Mountain Ash isn't really an ash? Who knows? I understand the developer of the streets off Newcastle in Bellaire submitted a plat and was told it had to include street names, so, on the spot, he just began assigning first names of family members. Did Frank Sharp or members of his family choose street names or was it a committee, or both? I have asked this question in the past on Facebook with no definitive replies. Maybe one or more readers knows how Sharpstown streets were named. Let's start with who was Mary Bates?

FOR THE LOVE OF TREES

Let's keep our neighborhood beautiful and resilient by planting more trees and properly taking care of our existing trees.

Why Plant Trees?

The question is simple and basic, but often not considered carefully enough when selecting trees. Before planting think about what benefits you would like your tree to provide. The addition of trees to your landscape is important for many reasons.

Consider some of the following reasons for planting trees:

- Energy conservation
- Trees planted strategically on the west, south and east sides of your home can reduce cooling costs by up to 50%. Deciduous trees shade your home during the hot summer months, while allowing sunlight to warm your home during the winter. Planting evergreen trees on the north side of your home will slow winter winds which can reduce heating costs by up to 30%.
- Increased property value

 Trees enhance the economic vitality of a city. Trees can increase
 property values by as much as 20%.
- Wildlife habitat
 Trees provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife in our urban environment.
- Aesthetics
 Trees beautify our urban environment by making our communities more livable and helping to restore our mental health and well-being.
- Improved air quality
 Trees act as filters by trapping dust and absorbing air pollutants, while releasing vital oxygen.

Storm water reduction
 Trees help reduce storm water runoff and soil erosion, while improving water quality.



RECYCLING THE RIGHT WAY

The City of Houston publishes a trash and recycling collection schedule but there are circumstances that often alter this schedule. Leave your container out and the next day is usually catch up day. If in doubt, call 311 or Scott at the SCA office for information. Here's a quick refresher on what to place in your GREEN curbside recycling bin and what goes in the black curbside trash container. Put these items in your GREEN Bin (make sure you empty and rinse plastic, metal, glass and coated containers).





PLASTICS #1-5

& #7







PAPER & NEWSPAPER

METAL and CANS:

METAL AND CANS

Aluminum and Tin Cans (rinsed drained)

PLASTICS:

Plastic Containers #1 - 5 and 7 (rinsed drained)

CARDBOARD and CARTONS:

Carton - Cardboard boxes and cartons from items such as milk, juice, soup, crackers, cream, beans, water, broth, wine, etc.

PAPER:

Paper, Newspaper, Catalogs, Magazines and Phone Books



GLASS:

Effective immediately, glass is accepted in the green curbside recycling bin.

Please don't put dirty paper (greasy pizza boxes), large plastic items like old toys, or plastic bags in the green bin!

These items clog the machinery used to process recyclables resulting in delays and expense.



Yard Waste or Grass Clippings are picked up on Wednesdays.

You may place waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 pm on the Friday prior to collection.

TRASH FACTS



How to set out your garbage and recycling:

- · City-provided containers must be placed at the curb between 6 p.m. the day before and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.
- Container must face the street with handle facing house.
- Containers must be accessible and not blocked by obstacles, including parked cars, trees, mailboxes, fencing etc. Blocked containers will not be emptied.
- · Leave at least a 3ft space between garbage and recycling container. This allows the truck to operate safely.
- Containers must be removed from the curb line and/or public view by 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection and stored in a secure location.


