





DEFINITIONS OF CRIME TYPES

Robbery — the taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation.

Burglary — (breaking and entering) an unlawful entry into a building for the purposes of committing an offence. Usually that offence is theft.

Theft — the act of stealing; the wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods or property of another; larceny. Examples include ransacking unlocked cars, taking property out of open garage doors, taking a purse off a front seat of an unlocked car, taking a mower out of the back of a pickup truck.

Aggravated Assault — an attempt to cause serious bodily injury purposely.

Property Crime — destruction, damage, vandalism

Rape — unlawful sexual activity carried out against the will of a male, female, or person under age, or incapable of consent.



A STORMY NIGHT'S LESSON IN EMERGENCY WISDOM

So this happened ... and thank God it turned out okay for me, my neighbors, passing cars and even my tree. Though my uneducated instinct landed me on the right path, I wanted to share my newfound wisdom on who and when to call in case of an emergency.

On one of our recent very stormy nights, I was leaving home for the evening and discovered that my 60+ year old oak tree had lost a limb blocking both lanes of Sharpview. With lightning and high winds eliminating any immediate action, my only goal was to protect others from the road hazard. I called S.E.A.L security, requesting any available hazard warnings signs and planned to deal with it later. To my relief and delight, by the time I got back home the limb had been mostly cleared, and two hazard sawhorses were in place. S.E.A.L had contacted the appropriate city departments. So, thank you S.E.A.L and the city! I swept and blew the debris from the street that night with plans to use my chainsaw to finish the clean up the following day. Early the next morning the city was already there to do it for me. I was obviously elated and supplied a dozen hot Shipley donuts to the three team crew!

When telling news (or fielding texts) on my arborist adventure with friends and neighbors, I became acutely aware of the varied opinions on what I should/could have done differently. This prompted me to do a bit of research and I thought it right to share these takeaways on when and when not to call 911 during emergencies.



EMERGENCY TRIVIA:

Medical Emergencies:

- The UK introduced the first emergency number in 1937, while the US adopted 911 in 1968, developed by AT&T for quick dialing on rotary phones
- Approximately 80% of 911 calls come from cell phones
- You can text 911
- 911 can often determine your location
- Siri and GoogleHome can call 911, but Alexa cannot



WHEN TO CALL 911: GENERALLY ACCEPTED SITUATIONS

Medical Emergencies:

- · Excessive bleeding
- · Loss of consciousness
- Signs of stroke/cardiac event
- Seizure
- · Severe difficulty breathing
- Choking
- Drug overdose
- · Life or limb-threatening conditions
- · Severe burns
- Poisoning

Situations + Crimes in Progress:

- Fire or smoke, home/building/business/car/wildfire
- Shooting
- Assault in progress
- Drowning
- Home invasion, burglary/robbery
- · Incident with a deadly weapon
- Serious car accidents
- When moving the victim could cause further injury

WHEN NOT TO CALL 911:

Calling 911 as a joke or without a real emergency is a crime. Avoid calling for:

- Tree branches blocking the road!
- · Property damage
- · Vehicle break-in
- · Burglary when the villain has fled
- Car accidents with no injuries
- Minor illness or injury
- · Pet accidents
- · Power outage
- Information
- · Directory assistance
- · Injured or lost pet
- Abandoned vehicles
- · Asking for directions
- · Parking complaints
- Questions about tickets, warrants, court dates, etc.

If you do have an emergency, call 911 and do not hang up. Be prepared to provide address, cross streets, specifics on incident. It is also always a great idea to have someone meet the emergency personnel on street/entrance and escort them to site.

Additional note: please make sure your house number is visible on both your house and the curb in front of your house ...



DEED RESTRICTIONS

DO YOU KNOW YOUR DEED RESTRICTIONS?

Remodeling your home? Adding On? Do you know your deed restrictions? Did you know that the Sharpstown Civic Association can look over your proposed plans for free before you start construction? We want to avoid deed restriction violations before they happen. Did you know that we have a 25 foot rear setback for the main structure? Did you know that there is a minimum percentage of brick that must be on your home? Did you know that you can't build in front of your building line? We want to help you! We want you to find out about possible violations before it costs you money and time. Several homeowners in the past couple years have had to tear down and/or modify their construction due to deed restriction violations. The City of Houston does not review deed restrictions when issuing permits. They require a signed affidavit acknowledging that the plans comply with your deed restrictions. This holds YOU, the homeowner, accountable for knowing and complying with your deed restrictions. We are here to help you. TNR - TRAP NEUTER RELEASE PROGRAM

Kitten season has begun early and females are in heat if they are not already pregnant. Over 400 cats have been spayed or neutered 2022-2024. Using the chart above this equates to 6,000 kittens that will not be born in Sharpstown in 2024 if half of the 400 were female. Can you see how this effort positively effects our neighborhood?

This chart represents one unspayed female, her mate and all of her offspring, producing 2 litters per year, with 2.8 surviving kittens per litter:

If you look at Sharpstown on any online map and pull up the satellite view, you will see a lot of concrete and rooftops. Study closely, however, and even park-starved Sharpstown has a narrow ribbon of green - bisected by electrical transmision wires.

For Charmaine LeBlanc, who is active in Sharpstown community groups, it was at least a start at some safe parklike space.

Pretty soon, officials say, it will become a running and biking trail in one of the places most in need of better pedestrian and cyclist connections, and a green space. This trail will enable people to get out of their homes, and renew themselves and potentially their communities.

"When I grew up in Meyer-land, we spent 90% of our time outdoors," said Welcome Wilson Jr., chairman of the Southwest Houston Redevelopment Authority. "Now it is the reverse."

The new trail, along about 1.8 miles of CenterPoint electrical transmission easement, will run from Sands Point Drive near the Westpark Tollway to Beechnut, close to Interstate 69.

Work on the trail is expected to take until autumn, according to current schedules. The \$3.1 million cost is split between TIRZ 20, which works closely with the Southwest Management District on projects in the Sharpstown area, and Harris County Precinct 4 Commissioner Lesley Briones' office, which has focused funding on improving public spaces and access to them.

The management district will maintain the trail upon its completion, citing its importance in offering commuting options to jobs and schools, as well as a chance for people to exercise.

"This trail will make this neighborhood more desirable as a place

to live and/or do business," said Kenneth Li, chairman of the management district.

In addition to the trail under the transmission lines, plans for the project - done in cooperation with the nonprofit Houston Parks Board - include street crossings and a new pedestrian traffic signal at Gessner. Providing the north-south route, Briones said, improves overall safety by giving pedestrians a choice.

"We don't need our children walking on Gessner," Briones said. "We all know how traffic-heavy it is."

LeBlanc, who kicked off discussion of the trail five years ago, said finding that safe space in Sharpstown was a tough fit.

"You cannot double-stack a park," she said of the dense community.

At first, the responce from CenterPoint, which maintains the easement for its lines, was refusal.

"They didn't want you to stand still," LaBlanc said. "Don't you dare put a bench down."

City officials, beginning in the Annise Parker administration and with support from state lawmakers, eased some of the utility's operations. Harris County finalized a similar agreement in 2020.

In manh Houston communities, park board President Beth White said, trail planners can easily accommodate the company and create useful links.

"I think all of us are getting smarter about dual-purpose and triplepurpose infrastructure." White said, noting the Bayou Greenways program along area flood control channels and bayous has a similar focus.

While development has been slower than some expected when CenterPoint and city officials agreed to the deal, White said in many places it remains the best way to connect the mostly east-west bayous via north-south electrical transmission lines.

Sharpstown is no different. Eventually, the aim is to connect the trail to the Brays Bayou Greenway, currently under construction less than a half-mile south of Beechnut.

"What we are doing is finding those links," White said. "Those connections are becoming so important.

MICHAEL MARHALL, LIVING IN SHARPSTOWN

I wrote a previous article about streets in Sharpstown, wondering how some of their names were chosen. I'm still wondering. This time it's about parks and schools and it's much easier. Let's start with the obvious. Two parks and two HISD schools, and indeed, Sharpstown are named for Frank W. Sharp, born in 1906 near Crockett, Texas. He moved to Houston after high school and in the 1930s, began building houses. After the Oak Forest subdivision was completed in 1955, Sharp began making plans for what was called, according to a brochure, "The biggest real-estate subdivision in the world". He named it Sharpstown. Sharpstown Park at Bellaire Boulevard and Harbor Town Drive and the much smaller Sharpstown Green Park at Hillcroft and Sharpview are named for him, as are Sharpstown High School and Sharpstown International School.

Monsignor (Father) Bill Pickard Park, formerly Lansdale Park, at Roos and Waldo, was renamed in for Father Pickard who had been the pastor of St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church for ten years. Monsignor (an honorary title, not a position) Pickard was one of several priests from this area who joined the famous civil rights march from Selma, Alabama in 1965 and later founded a hospital and dental clinic in Guatemala.

Crain Park at Pella and Triola was named for E.L. Crain, an architect and developer who worked with Frank Sharp in developing Oak Forest.

Bonham Park at Braes River and Carew and the elementary school next door are named for

James Butler Bonham, one of the soldiers defending the Alamo. He was sent by the commander, William Travis, to ask for help from the garrison at Goliad. But none was available, so he returned and was killed during the battle. He was born in South Carolina and was a second cousin of Travis.

Jane Long Academy at Bellaire Boulevard and Rookin was formerly called Jane Long Middle School. She is called the Mother of Texas and is one of the first women of English descent to settle here and to give to the first child born of an English speaking person.

Pat Neff Elementary at Tanglewilde and Neff, Neff was named for Pat Morris Neff, 28th Governor of Texas, 1921-1925 and the 9th president of Waco University, 1932-1947, his alma mater.

William S. Sutton Elementary at Albacore and Sharpview takes its name from William Seneca Sutton who was Superintendent of the Houston ISD from 1887 to 1897. He later served as the president of the University of Texas.

Edward H. White Elementary, across from Crain Park at Triola and Jorine, was named for a NASA astronaut, one of the second group selected. He graduated from West Point in 1952 and received test pilot training at Edwards Air Force Base in California. He was then assigned as a test pilot for the Aeronautical Systems Division at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio. He was the pilot of the Gemini 4 mission and was the first American to make a spacewalk. Ed White lost his life on January 27, 1967 during a training exercise for Apollo 1 when a fire broke out inside the capsule killing White and two other members of the crew, Gus Grissom and Roger Chaffee



RECYCLING THE RIGHT WAY

The City of Houston publishes a trash and recycling collection schedule but there are circumstances that often alter this schedule. Leave your container out and the next day is usually catch up day. If in doubt, call 311 or Scott at the SCA office for information. Here's a quick refresher on what to place in your GREEN curbside recycling bin and what goes in the black curbside trash container. Put these items in your GREEN Bin (make sure you empty and rinse plastic, metal, glass and coated containers).



METAL and CANS:

Aluminum and Tin Cans (rinsed drained)

PLASTICS:

Plastic Containers #1 - 5 and 7 (rinsed drained)

CARDBOARD and CARTONS:

Carton - Cardboard boxes and cartons from items such as milk, juice, soup, crackers, cream, beans, water, broth, wine, etc.

PAPER:

Paper. Newspaper, Catalogs, Magazines and Phone Books



GLASS:

Effective immediately, glass is accepted in the green curbside recycling bin.

Please don't put dirty paper (greasy pizza boxes), large plastic items like old toys, or plastic bags in the green bin!

These items clog the machinery used to process recyclables resulting in delays and expense.



Section 1 & 2 - Heavy Trash on Tuesday (second Tuesday of every month)

Section 3, 5, CCT1, CCT2, CCT3, Estates E&W - Heavy Trash on Monday (second Monday of every month)

Yard Waste or Grass Clippings are picked up on Wednesdays.

You may place waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 pm on the Friday prior to collection.



How to set out your garbage and recycling:

- · City-provided containers must be placed at the curb between 6 p.m. the day before and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.
- Container must face the street with handle facing house.
- Containers must be accessible and not blocked by obstacles, including parked cars, trees, mailboxes, fencing etc. Blocked containers will not be emptied.
- Leave at least a 3ft space between garbage and recycling container. This allows the truck to operate safely.
- Containers must be removed from the curb line and/or public view by 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection and stored in a secure location.
